Re: Recommended Objectives at the U.S./Canadian Border for Nitrogen and Phosphorus in the Red River Basin:

To Whom It May Concern:

The Red River Watershed Management Board (RRWMB) appreciates the opportunity to comment to the International Joint Commission (IJC) on the proposed objectives. For some historical perspective, the RRWMB is a joint powers board created in 1976 and authorized by the Minnesota Legislature to address flood issues in the Minnesota portion of the Red River Basin (RRB). Since that time, the RRWMB has helped fund close to 60 flood damage reduction projects in the RRB of Minnesota with our member watershed districts.

These projects can and do provide multiple benefits or Natural Resources Enhancements (NREs) to society including but not limited to flood control, water quality, and fish and wildlife habitat. Recently, the RRWMB adopted a strategic plan and one of our goals relates to water quality, with our 2020 operating budget including funding for local water quality efforts. While the RRWMB remains committed to flood damage reduction efforts, water quality will also be a focus of the work we do with our members.

The RRWMB Water Quality and Monitoring Advisory Committee recently met to discuss the proposed IJC objectives as directed by the RRWMB Managers. At this point, the RRWMB does not have further comments on this matter. The RRWMB is also a member of the Red River Retention Authority (RRRA), which recently submitted comments to the IJC regarding this matter.



We are also aware that the Bois de Sioux Watershed District (BdSWD), a RRWMB member, submitted comments. The RRWMB supports both of these comment letters and please take comments by the RRRA and BdSWD into consideration as the objectives are considered and finalized by the IJC.

Ultimately, the RRWMB supports water quality efforts and believes that further leveraging of programs, financial resources, and comprehensive plans and implementation of best management practices can be done to meet water quality goals in the RRB without additional regulation. We can accomplish meaningful change on the landscape by close communication with our partners and stakeholders.
