







Trend: 7+5% since 2015

90% of residents said it is important to protect Great Lakes health and water quality




Trend: 7+6% since 2015

80% of residents are concerned about the health and water quality of the lake that is closest to me.




Trend: 7+17% since 2015







84% of residents believe the role of the individual is important for protecting the health and water quality of the Great Lakes.




Top Three Responses 2015 - 2021

Who should be responsible for protecting the Great Lakes basin?




Trend: 7+12% since 2015

Who should be responsible for protecting the Great Lakes basin?




Trend: 7+13% since 2015

59% of residents feel there are too few policies and regulations in place to protect the Great Lakes.




Trend: ~ SAME since 2015

78% of residents agree that the economy of the region will suffer if the Great Lakes are not healthy.




Trend: ~ SAME since 2018

The majority of residents are willing to pay more for consumer products to enforce regulations that better protect the Great Lakes.




Trend: 7+7% since 2015

80% of residents agree that actions should be taken now to protect the Great Lakes for future generations.






Do you identify as a First Nations, Métis, or **Tribal Nation** member?




Trend: 715%+ vs. overall

95% or more of Indigenous individuals agree that actions should be taken now to protect the Great Lakes for future generations.




Trend: 717%+ vs. overall

A majority or more of Indigenous individuals believe the federal government should be responsible for protecting the Great Lakes basin.




Trend: 731%+ vs. overall

90% or more of Indigenous individuals believe the role of the individual is important for protecting the Great Lakes.




A majority or more of Indigenous individuals said there are fish, plant or wildlife of cultural importance they are concerned about due to threats to Great Lakes water quality.






Trend: 77%+ vs. overall

72% of younger residents and 97% of island residents are interested in Great Lakes news.




Trend: 76%+ vs. overall

A majority of younger residents and 71% of island residents use the Great Lakes for recreation or leisure.






91% of residents believe that it is important that the Great Lakes are available for leisure or recreational uses.




83% of residents agree that it is important to protect the Great Lakes for the benefit of fish and wildlife.




Distribution of respondents by their nearest lake




Please rate how safe you think it is to swim in the Great Lake that is closest to you.

Please rate how safe you think it is to drink water from the Great Lake that is closest to you.





With which water body do you have the greatest connection?




